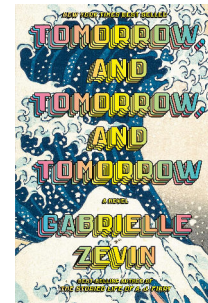

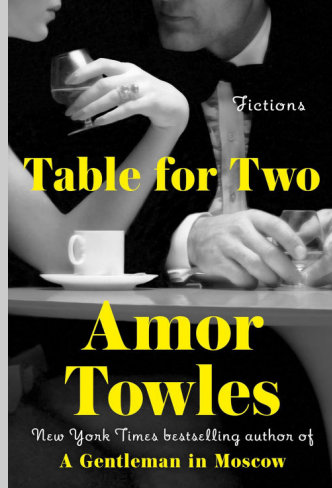

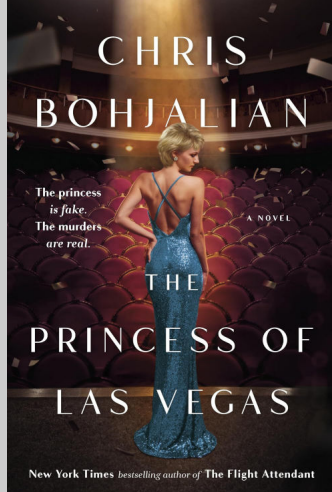


New Library Books!

From the bestselling author of *A Gentleman in Moscow* and *Rules of Civility*, six New York stories, most of which take place around the year 2000, consider the fateful consequences that can spring from brief encounters and the delicate mechanics of compromise that operate at the heart of modern marriages.

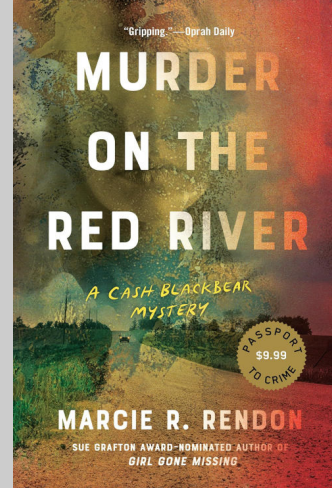
His novella set in Golden Age Hollywood centers on *Rules of Civility's*, Evelyn Ross. She leaves New York City in September 1938 with the intention of returning home to Indiana. But she instead extends her ticket to Los Angeles, beginning a tale that moves through the movie sets, bungalows, and dive bars of Los Angeles.



Bestselling author of *The Flight Attendant* and *The Lioness*, a Princess Diana impersonator and her estranged sister find themselves drawn into a dangerous game of money, murder, and family secrets on the Las Vegas strip.

Each evening, Crissy Dowling transforms into a Princess, performing her musical cabaret inspired by the life of the late Diana Spencer. Crissy's daily diet of Adderall and Valium leaves her more than a little tipsy, her Senator boyfriend has gone back to his wife, and her entire career rests on resembling a dead woman. But when Crissy's sister, Betsy, arrives in town and when the owner of the Buckingham Palace Casino is savagely murdered, Crissy's carefully constructed kingdom comes crashing down all around her.

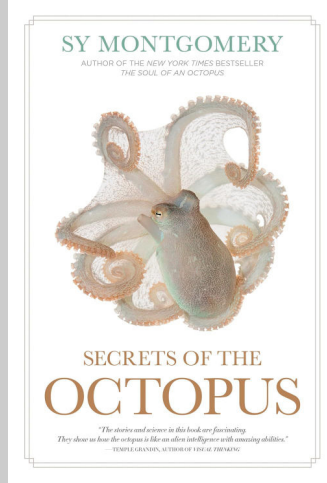

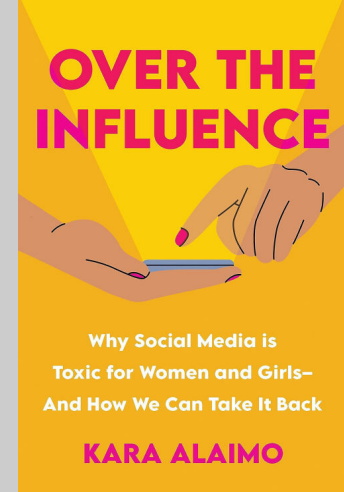

He discovered other trailblazers as well, from the "Sock Queen of Alabama" to a pair of father-son shoemakers and a men's style blogger who almost single-handedly drove a campaign to make "Made in the USA" cool. Eye-opening and inspiring, *American Flannel* is the story of how a band of visionaries and makers use cutting-edge technology and design to revive an essential American dream.

With this offering, Sy Montgomery, known as the "octopus whisperer," returns to the species she knows and loves, offering current and compassionate stories about the scientists on the front lines of octopus research and conservation.

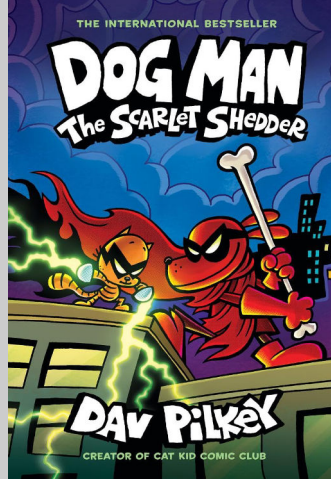
For all animal lovers-and especially those drawn to this magical marine being-this will be a book to relish, for both its fascinating imagery and its charming storytelling.

Over the Influence is a book about what it means to live in the world social media has wrought-whether you're constantly connected or have deleted your accounts forever. Why you're likely to get fewer followers if you're a woman. How fake news is crafted to prey on women's vulnerabilities. And how social media has made the offline world an uglier place for women.
